Activity in this academic year

This details how we intend to spend our PDG **this academic year** to address the challenges listed above.

Learning and Teaching

We have employed teaching assistants to support in class learning and early intervention support for vulnerable pupils to ensure that these pupils have equal access to the curriculum and do not fall behind. Teaching assistants have access to high quality CPD to ensure they are equipped with the skills needed to support these pupils.

We also employ a full time pastoral worker to support families with any issues they may have such as attendance, well being, social care needs and engaging families. Our pastoral worker has access to a wide range of high quality CPD and support. We will be having a big drive on attendance with a new rewards for all system designed in collaboration with school council.

The Craigfelen Pledge, created in collaboration with our school community is designed to give all pupils equal access to opportunities and experiences that our community thinks every child should get. Our vibrant and exciting curriculum gives opportunities to learn about a range of topics in a way to develop them as well rounded learners.

Community Schools

We will shortly be receiving the keys to Graigfelen Community Hall, which will then become known as The Cwtch Craigfelen as shown in our Community Plan. To help with the setting up of the Cwtch a member of staff will be released from class and will run sessions in the Cwtch. As well as this the Cwtch will host a Pay What You Can shop, Clothing/Uniform bank, Toy Swap Shop and Community Library. The Cwtch will also host a weekly community café as well as parenting sessions. Working in collaboration with Birchgrove Comprehensive School the Cwtch will hold extra curricular sessions for pupils and families. Working closely with Early Help Hub and UWTSD we are hoping to be able to set up a Youth Club.

After the initial setting up of our community voice group last year we want to build upon its start and recruit more members and voices to ensure we are truly representing the school's community.

Wider Strategies

Our new school therapy dog, Milo, has begun his training to enable him to support a range of learners with different needs. Four handlers have been identified and these handlers are currently taking part in high quality CPD to enable them to use Milo to the full range of his abilities.

More opportunities for music, sport, art and outdoor learning will be provided by specialist providers who will also provide CPD for teachers. This will provide equity in provision for all pupils.

School will take part in the Think Equal programme, organised by Partneriaith to develop social and emotional literacy in young learners. This year will focus upon children aged 4-5. We will also be developing our Health and Wellbeing teaching materials and programme.

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

PDG outcomes

This details the impact that our PDG activity had on pupils in the 2020 to 2021 academic year.

Baseline data, including that from Flying Start shows that the vast majority of pupils entered nursery and reception with skills below expected. A well sequenced and planned curriculum alongside a very high standard of teaching ensure pupils make fantastic progress in developing skills, knowledge and understanding across all areas of learning. In a range of assessments children make fantastic progress. Pupil progress meetings, work scrutiny and internal data shows pupils are making good progress from their starting points.

Our online wellbeing survey collects data from children in y2-y6 and highlights any children who may benefit from support due to a negative view of school, themselves or family. From here teachers fill out Boxhall Profiles and these are scored by our pastoral worker who then creates a programme for these learners. Our pastoral worker holds regular support meetings with families and runs specialist sessions to support the various needs of different families. Staff also provide a range of opportunities for learning through universal provision. All staff are very aware of different groups of vulnerable families and these children are discussed at termly APP meetings where support is reviewed or identified.

Music and dance lessons were extremely popular with pupils and produced some fantastic results in performances for a wide range of audiences. Lessons were provided for all classes across the school as well as Song Squad (school choir) and individual/group music tuition on instruments such as recorders, flutes and saxophones.

In partnership with the Sharing Table Cymru we ran a successful extra-curricular family cooking club that supported some of our most vulnerable families to spend time together, have fun, learn about budgets and healthy eating.
